## ADULT GUARDIANSHIP IN NEW YORK: ARTICLE 81VS. ARTICLE 17-A



## THERE ARE TWO TYPES OF ADULT GUARDIANSHIP IN NEW YORK:

- ARTICLE 81 GUARDIANSHIP: Also known as guardianship for incapacitated adults. This type of guardianship asks a judge to give a guardian only the powers necessary to meet an incapacitated person's needs. This may include powers to manage a person's finances and property, personal needs, or both.
- **ARTICLE 17-A GUARDIANSHIP:** This type of guardianship is only for an adult who needs *all* decisions made by a guardian *and* who has and intellectual or developmental disability, or traumatic brain injury.



## How are they different?

ARTICLE 81	ARTICLE 17A
Guardian only has powers necessary to meet the person's needs.	Guardian has power to make all decisions
Usually takes place in Supreme Court	Takes place in Surrogate's Court
Available for all types of impairments	Available for Intellectual and Developmental Disability and Traumatic Brain Injury only
Law Article 81 of the Mental Hygiene Law	Law Article 17-A of the Surrogate's Court Procedure Act
Focuses on functional limitations	Court requires a diagnosis
